

Association between Anthropometric Indices and Vitamin D Levels: Results From the Yazd Health Study



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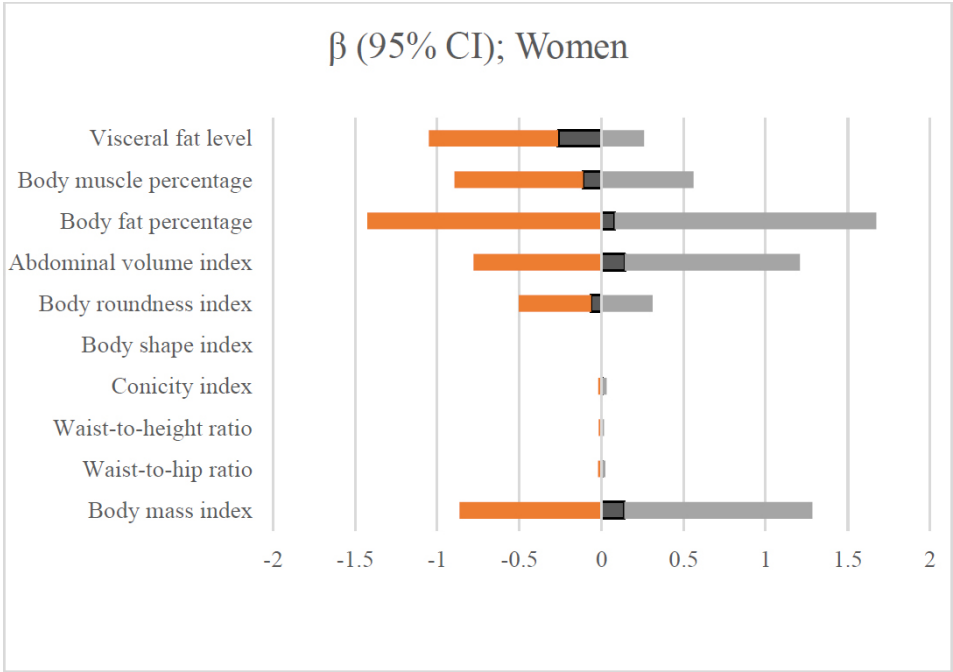
